

Introduction

HHC 2023 was exceptional for a long list of reasons. The first was in selecting the location. Stephen Thomas was the point person and he wanted to sponsor HHC 2022 in Orlando, but his personal life did not permit him to dedicate the time required. He was able to do so this year, and he did a superb job going above and beyond. Orlando is a VERY popular tourist destination with Cape Canaveral and Disney World being known worldwide. This situation has required the hotels to have some unusual high costs and policy requirements that the Committee hadn't experienced before. While the Hyatt Hotel had some restrictions contrary to our needs, they made an extra effort to accommodate us. Stephen first compiled a list of hotels and they were compared and a short list made. Bob Prosperi has a home close by and he went down from (New York) and met with Stephen to visit several on the short list. Their results were Committee accepted and we announced.

Probably the next aspect of HHC 2023 that also impacted everybody was the outstanding number of presentations - 30 in total including the three "HP" remotes. In order to make it all happen we decided to just allow everyone 30 minutes, start earlier, and go later for the Conference hours. This worked quite well although the Committee seriously noticed the extra overall effort required with simple exhaustion setting in on getting home. Several days of R&R were required all around. Perhaps age is catching up with us.

Another exceptional aspect this year was the rise in attendance. While we mostly deal with handhelds, the table space each attendee seems to need includes a laptop, AC power, and lots of other items including cameras. The classroom style was set up as ten rows of two tables with two chairs instead of the normal three. This provided a "big" personal space for 40 attendees. In fact we asked for more tables than the hotel had available, but we made do nicely. The 41st attendee sat on the side. Sorry about that.

First timers were Nils Anderson and Mark Powel from Sweden and the UK respectively, and Geoff Granger, Claudia Granger, Jeff Birt, Jason Li, and Deb Elliot. This is great. The non-US attendees made up 17% and we have completely recovered from the COVID -19 restrictions that impacted attendance for HHC 2021 & to some extent HHC 2022. The numbers were: 1-UK, 3-Canada, 2-Germany, 1-Sweden.





Fig. 2 – Link response if not yet posted.

HHC 2023 USB drive

Eric Rechlin started recording the Conference USB drive (#8 on the list) with the same enthusiasm he has demonstrated with all of the projects he has on the Fig. 3 list. Each year the drive contents increase and it is clear that for HHC 2024 we will need 512 GB to contain all of the documentation that PPC & HHCs have inspired and generated. This is half a Tera Byte! Based on past experience he provides more drives for non-attendees than attendees for a given HHC. This also generates revenue for the HHC kitty.

When we first started with the current USB drive practice there was a debate about the usefulness (and cost) of such a drive. One argument was that the cost wasn't worth the effort because the vast majority of the information was on the internet. I believe that the interest and success of this approach of "providing the most extensive HP calculator information possible in your pocket" is useful. Some of the historical information is no longer found on the internet. Besides, the internet is bloated with so much duplication that navigating it is very time consuming. The HHC USB drive is a significant improvement in efficiency and usefulness. With the latest HHC drive and the website and #9 on the Fig. 3 list you have it all, and with HHUC now also actively contributing it is getting even better and more complete.

Contest winners

Prizes

Our door prizes are issued by randomly drawing the attendee numbers (by the blue ticket) and were substantial - as has been the case for all of the recent conferences. The drawing is done as the penultimate activity of the Conference. Every attendee had at least four chances to pick from the regular prize table. Since some prizes were “bundles” so you could go home with more than four calculators. I went home with Two TI’s, one Casio, and one Calculated Industries.

Premium prizes

We selected eight prizes that are drawn last – see Fig. 7. Every attendee gets an equal chance for these. The Committee picks special prizes to be held as Premium Prizes for their dollar value, historical value, collector’s value, or just being the latest model available. SwissMicros was very generous with three new DM machines this year. Here are the premium prizes and their winners.




Fig. 5 – Prizes at back wall near inside door.

Lessons learned with possible future implementation?

If HHC 2024 follows the path of the last two Conferences we are still very active with the HP User Community carrying on. HP is slowly getting their two licensees up to speed in regards to carrying on the HP Calculator name. Like all things in life major projects seldom happen as fast as expected. From the presentations given the licensees are seriously working to meet the HP standards expected of them and they are also recognizing the various activities of their users. They are working with various community members like HP has in the past for product reviews, manual writing and review, ideas for the future, and being reminded of past promises made.

One of our challenges is the schedule with the many aspects of presenter availability, audio/visual aids, and presentation sources. Ideally a simple laptop and the Conference USB Conference drive should suffice. There are some presenters who MUST use their machine. This complicates the cabling and adapter challenges which add additional time between presentations. Over the years the technical aspects seem to get more complex and the result is additional schedule challenges. At least four schedule versions are produced even before printing the schedule at the hotel. There always changes during the Conference and the recorded videos best documents this. Many thanks Eric.

We decided to make every presentation 30 minutes and this really helped with the mechanics. We must have the presentations for the Conference USB drive so presenters need to keep a schedule. The more presenters the more complicated things seem to get.

We gained some time by having one prize drawing cycle with the winner picking two items from the prize table with a single draw.

HHC 2024

We have a standard format for an HHC. While the importance of some aspects of our Conferences have changed over the decades, e.g. we no longer produce printed proceedings or dedicate as much time to reports on “club” activities, we still have a standard sequence of activities.

One of them is the discussion of the location of the next Conference. Our foreign attendees are especially interested because they tend to plan longer in advance that we do. Using our “formula” we are able to provide potential dates for HHC 2024. Here are the planning dates that were discussed. We need several dates to be able to have a desired availability at the selected hotel once a point/host person and location is determined. For HHC 2024 the dates are.

1. 3rd weekend of September 2024. 24th & 25th.
2. 4th weekend of September 2024. 28th & 29th.
3. 3rd weekend of October 2024. 19th & 20th.

We did not have a strong agreement for a 2024 location. Three locations were discussed.

David Ramsey could host HHC 2024 in Reno NV. HHC 2014 & 2019 were in Reno.

Gene Wright could host in Nashville TN. HHC 2012, 2015, 2017, 2021, & 2022 were in Nashville.

Namir Shammass could host in Richmond VA for the first time.

A decade ago we would have a very good idea of where the Conference would be held while discussing the subject at a current HHC. In the last few years everything seems to be in a greater state of flux and the actual location is not as we might have been predicted.

Communicating with interested HHC attendees

The two most important aspects for HHCers are being on the Conference email list and monitoring the HHC website. Usually the website for a given year becomes active when a hotel is selected and a contract is signed. HHC List activity is most active the month before and after a Conference. 


Fig. 12 – CVD Retired Jim Donnelly asks HP a question

HHC 2023 finances.

We carried a balance of \$4,316.44 from 2022.

We collected \$100 from 41 attendees for \$4,100 for 2023.

The hotel, food, and supply 2023 costs were \$3,662.70. The 2023 income is 437.30.

The current balance is \$4,753.74 carried for HHC 2024.

Observations and conclusion

An HHC is an opportunity to meet and learn from many of the most active members of the HP User Community. These include consultants to HP – now to Moravia -, book authors, accessory designers, and over all experts in electronics, mathematics, programming, the user interface, and analysts of the calculator market and user interests.

As we learned from the active managers in the new HP calculator licensee business it has taken longer than expected for each player to get up to speed in meeting HPs standards for all aspects of the calculator market. I suspect that next year we will see greater improvements in getting the new system running smoothly.

Clearly the HP calculator websites need additions and improvement, but we expect this to happen as each entity learns its part in getting HP calculators to the world. HHC 2023 attendees were encouraged and inspired by the three remote presentations.
