# A brief background

- I've been archiving HP calculator files since I started hpcalc.org in 1997
- Since 2020, I've been scanning all HP calculator-related books and manuals for literature.hpcalc.org
- I've produced the HHC USB drive since HHC 2017 (Richard produced drives for several years before then)



### HHC 2025 USB Drive

- Collection of nearly everything I can find related to HP calculators, plus some other extras for other brands of calculators and other HP products
- Much of its contents is spread across the Internet — but some is not
- ▶ Do you know of something that should be archived in the future? Tell me!

#### **HHC Conference Materials**

Contains materials from HHC conference floppies, CDs, DVDs, and USB drives from 1998 through 2025, plus many of the presentation files.

#### **HP Conference Videos**

Contains captures of the talks presented at the live-streamed HPCC 2020 conference and HPCC January 2021, October 2021, and January 2024 mini-conferences, and videos recorded by Eric Rechlin of the talks presented at the HHC 2011 through 2024 conferences, as well as the HPCC 2022 and Allschwil 2022 conferences, plus others' recordings of the Allschwil 2016 and 2018 and HPCC 2023 and 2024 conferences, along with a couple videos presented at earlier conferences, Gene Wrights' training videos for financial calculators, and a few other videos.

### hp41.org

All the file downloads from Warren Furlow's hp41.org(continual mind) site, the Internet's largest collection of HP-41 resources, archived as of September 22, 2025. Based on the November 6, 2020 torrent copy of the DVD and manually updated with all esupdates made since then.

#### hpcalc.org

An offline mirror of Eric Rechlin's hpcalc.org<sup>(control loc)</sup> site, the Internet's largest collection of HP graphing calculator resources, with over 9000 items, archived as of September 21, 2025. Also includes historic older versions of all files ever on the site plus allows direct browsing of the contents of all compressed archives.

#### PPC Archive 2.47 - April 2025

A full copy of Jake Schwartz's vast collection of over 88,000 pages of information, including materials from various HP calculator clubs that were active in the 1970s to the present, plus materials from EduCALC and HP, current through April 1, 2023. Updates are available for purchase from Jakelseimse (Including Including Inc






# A new drive again

- ▶ Last year was the first with a 512 GB drive
- ► That drive has not dropped in price

- Over 110 GB free, so we should be good for a couple more years













- ► HP Museum Forum has one more year of posts

- Added one other video (HP-65 training) I found online




### Literature Archive additions

- Comprehensive collection of HP calculator documentation
- ▶ 10,500 more pages in 97 more books than last year
- ▶ PDFs sourced from HP:
  - ▶ 545 items totaling 87,802 pages
- ▶ PDFs sourced from the user community:
  - ▶ 1442 items totaling 188,849 pages
    - ▶ 945 of these, with 127,071 pages, were scanned by me
- ▶ Total is 1987 items with 276,651 pages (52.4 GB)




## Literature archive size over time

  - Computer Science On Your HP-41 Using the Advantage ROM
  - ► HP-75 NOMAS Volume 1: Source Code
- ▶ Also looking for more "internal" documentation:
  - Most service manuals I scanned are photocopies, not originals
  - More NOMAS listings, like HP-75 I/O ROM, 82104A Card Reader ROM, 82180A Extended Functions ROM, and 82905B Printer ROM


- One is included in your conference packet



There are three general types of rotate functions on the HP 16c, encompassing eight different functions.

11110000 Ь

- Rotate left and right (RL, RR).
- Rotate left and right "through the carry bit" (RLC), RRC).
- Rotate n places (RLn, RRn, RLCn, RRCn).


**Rotation.** Pressing fRL (rotate left) or fRR (rotate right) causes the contents of the X-register to rotate (or "circularly shift") one bit to the left or right. Bits shifted out of the word re-enter it at the other end. The carry flag is set if a 1 bit is rotated around the end, and is cleared if a zero is rotated around the end.



#### Section 4: Arithmetic and Bit Manipulation Functions

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Rotation Through the Carry Bit. The RLC and RRC (rotate left through carry) and rotate right through carry) functions respectively load the leftmost or rightmost bit of a word into the carry bit, and move the carry bit into the other end of the word.



The status of the carry flag (flag 4) is the same as if  $\mathbb{RL}$ ,  $\mathbb{RR}$ ,  $\mathbb{RLC}$ , or  $\mathbb{RRC}$  were performed |n| times. For instance, executing  $\mathbb{RRn}$  with n=3 will set the carry flag only if the third bit from the right (bit 2) is 1.

**Example:** Develop a keystroke sequence that will serve to rotate left *as* one word a 16-bit word divided into two separate 8-bit words held in two separate registers. For instance, with a word size of eight bits, rotate the word 00011100 111001111.

Keystrokes	Display	(STATUS: 2-08-1000)
11100	00011100 b	High order portion of 16-bit word.
f SL	00111000 Ь	Moves most significant bit into carry bit.
g LSTX	00011100 Ь	Recovers high-order portion.

g RLC	110011110 Ь	Carry bit (most significant bit of high-order portion) moves into least significant bit position of low-order portion.
